Humor has been extensively discussed in recent linguistic research. Humor, as part of the universal human transcultural trait, occurs in people's everyday lives, either as a conscious linguistic expression or as a spontaneous reaction to phenomena that surround us, which are not necessarily caused by the actions of human beings. The aim of the presentation is to offer an insight into different aspects of linguistic research of humor, primarily Raskin's Semantic Script theory, and Raskin and Atardo's seminal General Theory of Verbal Humor, as well as the interconnectedness of linguistic research of humor with other disciplines.
